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PRESIDENT'S CORNER

At our last meeting there were a number of people who got up and told us about various types of allergic reactions that they had with different kinds of wood ranging from cocobolo to mesquite. My initial thought was-perhaps I should stop working with exotic woods and just use domestic hardwoods. But didn't I read that domestic cherry had a high degree of arsenic in it? I remember, however that one fellow said that as long as he had a respirator he didn't experience any problems with cocobolo. Then I remembered a similiar problem I had with kingwood, my eyes watered, I started choking and coughing and the whole shop was filled with kingwood dust, it wasn't until I went outside that I got better.

The kingwood dust was made by my super-duper Bosch variable speed 4 x 24 sander with a 240 grit belt. I added even more kingwood dust to the air in my shop with my super-duper Bosch variable speed orbital sander with a 320 grit disk on it. Not once did I consider using one of the many not so super-duber cabinet scrapers that I have, that would be so "low tech" and besides with my hi tech sanders I can get a hi tech respirator and a hi tech dust collector and a hi tech air cleaner. Is it the wood we work or how we work the wood? Am I getting a reaction to "hi tech"? What are your thoughts on this?

ANTIQUE WOODS OF TEXAS

Last month we talked about the 95 year old grain elevator that was being dismantled in Port Arthur, Texas by the Davies Rail and Mechanical Workes, Inc. Nearly two million board feet of longleaf yellow pine from the virgin forest of South East Texas were milled by the Lutcher and Moore Lumber Co. of Orange for its construction. The magnificent longleaf soared 100 to 200 feet in the air with bases 4 or 5 feet in diameter.....often 50 or 60 feet to the lowest limb. Angela Schnuerle, President of Davies Rail wants the wood kept in Texas and is willing to sell amounts in any quanities. Timbers range in size from 13" x 13" to 24" x 24" x 27 feet long, also available is 2 x 6 and 2 x 8 at various lengths, to shorter pieces available for picture frames, carvings, small furniture, etc. Prices range from as little as 50 cents to over 2.25 a board foot. They are open during the week and sometimes on Saturday, but its best to call first, Port Arthur number 409-985-8847, Houston number 713-449-4717.

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
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
