MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Mistakes Were Made...

Our dining room table has become the de facto drop zone for all of the books, papers, files, etc. that are in use for managing the household, volunteer activities, extended family, and all other detritus. To make clearing the table efficient so we can actually eat there, I am building a library cart to hold the mess and allow it to be wheeled away to a storage location under the stairs. It is a simple cart, with two sides, a bottom panel, and two shelves. Dimensions of the box part of the cart were to be 30" wide, 33" tall and 14" deep and wood is red oak. Nothing fancy.

To stretch my skills, I decided to make the two side and bottom parts as bookmatched panels. I found an 8/4 red oak board that was 9" wide and just over 98" long. It was just long enough to make the side panels at 33" each and the bottom panel at 29-1/2", but there wasn't much room for error in length. The shelves would be made from lumber I already had.

I cut the 8/4 red oak into rough length for the sides and bottom panel and milled the parts flat with one straight, square edge. I successfully resawed the blanks into two pieces that were reasonably flat and straight. I let those pieces acclimate for several days, then milled the parts flat, straight and to final thickness, 5/8". I left the parts slightly oversized in length and width. I glued up the panels and shelves and everything was looking very good.

It was only five pieces, two sides, two shelves and a bottom. How hard could it be to keep the parts organized? I did not label the parts thinking I couldn't possibly screw up which parts go where. After glueing up the parts, I stickered the stack until I could get back to them. First order of business was to cut the parts to final length. The two shelves and bottom were 29-1/2" long and the two sides were 33" long. I set a stop block on my cross-cut sled at 29-1/2" and cut the two shelves. (Cont. on Page 2)

I then grabbed a one of my book-matched panel and cut it to the same length.

I reset my stop block to 33" and cut the next book-matched panel. Imagine my surprise when I put the final panel on the sled, only to find out that it is only 30-1/2" long! I had cut one of my side panels to the wrong (and much shorter) length!

Now my cart is 30" tall instead of the design height of 33". And I now have all of the parts clearly labeled after fitting stopped dadoes for each of the two shelves.



Join skilled woodworker Andy Tofuri as he shares his expertise in crafting the visually striking 3D End-Grain Tumbling Block Cutting Board. Known for its Q*bert-like pattern, this cutting board demands precision and will test your skills and patience. Andy will take us through his process, from material selection to final glue-up, while providing valuable insights and visual aids, including photos and live visual-aids.

Hardwood Derby

With the date of the Derby shifted to May, there will be one last opportunity to buy wheels and axles at the April 15 meeting. A sizing box will be available, so you can how the sizing check works. You can bring cars to check if you like.

The current plan for the running of the races is that all cars will participate in the first round. Most heats will involve four cars, but some may be only three depending on the actual number of entries on the day. Each car will race four times, switching lanes each time so that any car only runs once in each of four lanes. The car's cumulative time over the four runs will determine who advances to the next round.

The fastest 16 cars from the preliminary round will move on the quarter finals. The quarter finals will consist of four 4-car heats run on the same basis as the preliminaries. The fastest 8 cars move on to the semis, and the fastest four cars from the semi finals will move on to the finals.

When you check in on race day, cars will be size checked. If they pass, a numbered sticker will be attached and the cars will be handed off to the race handlers. You may not touch your car after that point, unless repairs become necessary. Race Rules


Meet the Members
