MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

James Krenov in "The Fine Art of Cabinetmaking" said "A good rule of thumb is to buy as much as you can sensibly afford of any wood that excites you and then, quickly, buy a little bit more." But be careful, that path can lead to hoarding!!




