

R & D SPACE-AGE SAW GUARD Reprinted from FINE WOODWORKING

This table-saw guard, developed for cutting space-shuttle insulation, holds several

advantages over conventional guards. Because it is counterbalanced, the guard makes lighter contact and is easier to operate, especially with thick materials. By sliding the counterweight up or down the arm, the operator can adjust the downward force of the clear plastic enclosure. The guard doesn't preclude dadoing and grooving operations, which are impossible with some other types of guards. The design was developed by Benjamin R. Dunn and Paul P. Zebus of Rockwell International.
