

He went to the observatory, the aquarium, the science museum and a bunch of interesting locales and one day visited the Art Museum in Chicago, He was always interested in art...his dad was an artist who worked for Disney. One day as he was leaving the museum, he looked over to the left and saw a door with a sign over it that said, "decorative arts section". Next day he entered that door, walked down the steps and saw the most beautiful furniture he has ever seen! Beautiful stuff! The labels said Chippendale, Sheraton, Queen Anne, Early American etc. Needless to

say he visited that section of the Art Museum for many, many days. Bought a book about furniture and got pulled in deeper. Then it hit him... he wanted to build furniture like that so he bought his very first book, "Fine furniture for the Amateur Cabinetmaker" by A.W. Marlow, (still has the book). 
