MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

The WWCH Board is reviewing your responses to the survey (about 33% of the members responded). It seems we have already had monthly meeting presentations about subjects of high importance to our members; use of hand tools (68.3%) in January and finishing (66.7%) in February. The survey did not include a category that would include the presentation on spalting, and I heard mixed reviews at the meeting but a good percentage of those found the presentation very interesting. The Board is using your expressed interests as a guide going forward. The Board has also heard your message about the book library; 75% agree with selling it but 25% have reasons to keep it. This has been a long time asset of the club so the Board does not take the book library's future lightly. Based on the comments in the survey, the Board will be reviewing the books and definitely keeping books of patterns and how to do things, but at the same time doing some high grading to eliminate duplications, outdated items, and non-educational books.

There are also some issues with the video/cd/dvd library. That library is under review to make new copies of existing materials on media that can no longer be read or has skips, etc. And the library is slowly growing. A recent purchase was a set of Woodwright shop videos that came on sale. Denis Muras is kindly spending considerable volunteer time on the digital library review and update. On this subject, don't forget that WWCH needs a new volunteer digital librarian to facilitate access to the library for all members. Everyone's help is needed to make this club and its activities what we all want them to be.

Club activities and planning are well underway. We started activities with the Hands-On Houston Day at the Houston Center for Contemporary Crafts which is followed on April 26 by the Gathering of the Guilds at HCCC for one of the annual Museum Days. This activity will be coordinated by John Gay and David Garcia. Watch the newsletter and emails for information about field trips occurring in the April – June time frame, and the annual shop crawl this year in the Sealy/Bellville area in the fall. If you have some specific field trip ideas, please let a board member know.

The featured speaker, Dr. Mueller, put on a good program with his great speaking abilities and some humor. He covered the topics of what spalting is, how it occurs, how you can create your own spalted wood, and the safety aspects of working with spalted wood. The information was very interesting and Dr. Mueller fascinated us with the mechanism of spalting and his own experimentation with growing the fungi and facilitating the spalting process. He's living a little outside the box with these activities. He dispelled the myth that it is hazardous to work with spalted wood because of the fungi. The fungus dies when the wood dries, but there is still the usual hazard of inhaling fine dust particles and possible allergic reactions. Please be safe and wear a dust mask anytime you are making dust.

SPEAKER RECAP: Dr. Dave Mueller – Spalted Wood, What it is, How to make it, and How to use it.

Dr. Dave Mueller of Bryan, TX held the members spell bound as he talked passionately on the many aspects of Spalted Wood. This beautiful wood is made that way in nature, and in a covered tub with a little water, steeped till the colors and veining of the various fungus strains have made their marks on the wood and in the wood to your liking. Then just dry it out and you've got a uniquely beautiful piece of wood for your project. That's the simple side. There are a lot of variables when it comes to spalting your own wood. Want a little more color in your wood, then turn loose a few different species of fungi for a truly colored effect, or apply a little dye for a rainbow of color. Dr. Mueller stated that credit must be given to Dr. Sara Robinson, Asst. Prof. of Wood Anatomy, Oregon State University, for her extensive research into the science of spalting. 

Chuck Meeder made the sign of ash for his 12 year old musician grandson from a Steve Good pattern. It reads “without music, life would Bb”. The one inch thick mahogany rose is mounted on figured maple in a cherry shadowbox frame and finished with Watco Danish Oil.

Tim Shaunty was in the right place at the right time when an old railroad bridge was demolished. He reclaimed 9 different species of wood to craft these fine wine racks. Do note that the wine glass holders are reversible: red side up for red wines, and white side up for whites! Genius. They were finished with coats of Liberon oil.



Jerry Harmsen turned these exquisite pens from a variety of woods. Each one is such a unique, special gift!

Bob Wink's answer to the open call on guns, is his No-Fun Gun see-saw. Another tramp art treasure!



Josh Nichols completed this table in just two weekends. Crafted from reclaimed red oak, quarter sawn, it has mortise and tenon joints and a shellac finish.

Ron Kuenning repurposed Cedar picket fence boards into a door mat from a plan found in an April 2008 Workbench magazine. He used glue and Kreg screws to assemble it, and added the river rock decorative accent. The finish, to be applied later, will be Watco Oil stain and shellac.

John Gay fashioned this Lock Box in Maple and Oak. The box can be mounted on the wall with a French cleat as a piece of wall art, as a medicine cabinet, as a bank by putting a slot in the top, or a stand alone art piece. The key to open the heart is discreetly hidden... somewhere.



Rick Spacek's woodburning skills created this lovely picture of an eagle "standing watch" in the National Cemetery. He used Baltic Birch, and raised the tombstones in the foreground. These beautiful double owls are finished in polyurethane with accents in acrylic. The wood? Rick says whooo knows!



Fred Sandoval created another tool to fit a purpose. A Wood Tap/Screw with a clamp in mahogany and Red Oak. The grooves are cut into a 2" rod with a router or it could be done on a band saw. By hand, definitely a "pain". Made for a classical workbench.



Chuck Lickwar needed a fabulous display case for his fabulous fridge magnets. So he turned some yellow Cedar into this rotating case. Its three sides are steel plates on plywood painted red, white, and blue indicating that they hold three increasing strengths of magnets.

SPEAKER COMING IN MAY: PAUL CARR, TRAIN BUILDER

Carr's train brings joy to the Houston Heights.

Lifelong Heights resident and civic leader Paul Carr, and his wife, Mary, were traveling through the Lake of the Ozarks in Missouri last summer, when they noticed a wooden train in a park.

Carr, 74, decided it would be a good idea to put a similar train in Donovan Park — a Houston Heights Association-owned park at Heights Blvd. and 7th St. — so neighborhood kids could enjoy it.

Carr spent all of his spare time and \$4,000 in tools and materials to build the five-car wooden train, along with the tracks out of 100 percent treated lumber.

"I can't say how great it makes me feel," Carr said. "Once I saw the train in Missouri, I thought 'I've got the skill and knowledge'. I couldn't find an excuse not to build the train."

Carr and a half-dozen volunteers from the Heights Association assembled the train in the park, and about 24 kids began playing on it shortly after it was put together.

"It thrilled me to watch the kids enjoy it," Carr said. "That was the payoff. It's our Christmas gift to the kids."

Carr, who is retired from the Houston Fire Department, was instrumental in helping the Heights Association buy the park in 1982. If the Association hadn't bought it, it was set to become a truck repair site.

The park is named for James Donovan, father of longtime Heights philanthropist and business owner Marcella Perry.

The train fits in perfectly with the park, which has a railroad theme. Many years ago, the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railroad ran nearby the park.


