
Thank you note from Mr. John Jackson

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Learning Intarsia

Intarsia, like many things in life, can be learned the hard way or the easy way. The hard way (trial and error) can work if you have a lot of patience and a few years to hone your skills. An easier way, as I learned first-hand a few weeks ago, is to attend one of Judy Gale Robert's (JGR's) 3-day Intarsia classes. Whether you are a true beginner or have a few years of experience, I am quite sure you will learn a lot from her and have a great time too.


JGR's studio-workshop is well designed, comfortable, and equipped with an assortment of Excaliber, Dewalt, and Eclipse scroll saws. Class sizes are kept small (typically 7 to 9 people) so there is plenty of time for individual attention as you work on a project that you will get to take home with you.

The quaint town of Gatlinburg and the Great Smokey Mountain National Park are located within an hour of JGR's studio-workshop, so I would highly recommend combining a few extra days in the area. The Smokey's are a beautiful change from our flat landscape, particularly in October, when the foliage colors are on display. The north end of Pigeon Forge is about 20 minutes from JGR's studio-workshop, but beware that the traffic in Pigeon Forge is pretty bad (even by Houston standards). I thought Pigeon Forge was a little too cheesy-touristy for my taste with two notable exceptions – Dollywood and the Applewood Farmhouse Restaurant. Pigeon Forge does have a fairly good trolley system and plenty of outlet malls so if you bring a spouse, she would have plenty to see and do, and have a way to get around.



Richard Storm won the Screw Driving Contest followed by Lon Kelley and Walter Roush.


Sawing saw Lon Kelley at first place followed by Chuck Graham and Saul Harris.
