SEPTEMBER SPEAKER RECAP WAYNE SMITH

Wayne Smith, a representative of Mirka, the abrasives firm, spoke to club members about abrasive technology, manufacture, and how it applies to woodworking. He introduced some of the new abrasive products. It was "sandpaper 101". Who knew all the subtle differences in sandpapers and their effects on woods?

He discussed backings: paper, nylon net, film, removable, and the grades from A to F and "P" grade (constant conformity). Soflex sponges, and abranet so fine it's used by the bowling ball industry...no dust! Then on to grain types: silicone, aluminum, release properties, and finishing tools like the CEROS (Ceramic Electric Rotating Orbital Sander).

To say it was a fact-filled presentation, is an understatement. It was an amazing look into how precise the technology has evolved to address each type of woodworking need.

Fred Sandoval presented this “Lone Star Chair” that matches his dining table. Constructed with no right angles and wedged tenons, The seat is poplar, the back and arms are yellow pine and Red Oak, Fred handmade the mahogany and pine star with a chisel and saw. The wood was a little rough, but three coats of Liburon Oil fixed that.



Everett Wooman's lamp went out, so what did he do? He salvaged the lens and crafted a handle for it. Now he has a beautiful magnifying glass. His daughter wanted a china cabinet, so Everett went to work. He presented a slide show of the walnut and cherry cabinet he crafted in two sections with tambour doors. The walnut and cherry came from his father's farm. It contains 100 biscuits and is finished in a water-based polyurethane. Oh, the finished cabinet was shipped to California!

Andy Anderson continues his repurposing of the stacks of walnut frames he came upon. Mother Nature provided the starfish, but Andy supplied the creative mounting! The background is that velvet paper from Hobby Lobby.



Rick Spacek burned the bridge scene and colored it with water colors. The cross is of back-to-back butterflies in baltic birch and red oak. He's holding a tiny scroll sawed butterfly.



Mark Behring showed club members the intarsia Christmas decorations, the beach scene (colored with water colors) and the basket-weave cups that he crafted.



Ron Kuenning brought these fine looking shelves of black walnut he made for his brother in Nebraska. Then he made one for himself. Finished with spar varnish.

John Gay uses found cedar fence boards from old fences for many of his projects. He showed before and after pieces of a salvaged fence. Hard to believe this good looking wood is from a well-used fence. It's dry, old, and strong. He sands it by hand, "sparks fly" if a belt sander hits an embedded nail.



David Garcia holds a scroll sawed this beautiful cross, finely crafted in mahogany and poplar, which signifies life after death. The tiger clock is just grrreeaaatttt!



Denis Muras recent sports car made of walnut, maple and cherry. Toymaker Press has the plans for many vintage cars...even a 57 Chevy! Good lookin', Denis!

Denis brought back from Atlanta, this wide-mouthed clamp and a sample "ready made" drawer.



Steve LeGrue brought several bowls that he turned of various woods that were just lying around his shop: pecan and curly maple. A trip to Santa Fe inspired some new designs. Steve used waterlox for a finish.



Henry Majoue wife's friend wanted a pantry on wheels...no problem. To match the kitchen cabinet styles, he hand planed the moldings, and used European hinges. It's made of red oak.

WONDERS OF WOODS

In the Wasatch Mountains located in the Fishlake National Forest and close to Fish Lake which is located on the western edge of the Colorado Plateau in south central Utah, there exists a [clonal] tree network of 47,000 Quaking Aspen trees nicknamed Pando, (*Populus tremuloides*), growing from a single root system.

The root system is estimated to be over 80,000 years old although the average age of the trees, measured by counting the tree rings is approximately only 130 years old. It is genetically uniform and acts as a single life form, thus changing the color and shedding the leaves of all the trees in unison. The entire system covers approximately 106 acres and weighs 13,224,000 pounds or about 6,600 short tons or 5,903 long tons.

Cork trees [*Quercus suber*], are stripped of their bark every 10 years or so and will continue to grow for 150 years or more.

AZ SUNSHINE CLUB

The Sunshine Club at the Ahwatukee Recreation Center makes toys and other keepsakes for children at hospitals, schools, and churches among several other organizations. The woodworking club started in 1979. Nearly 100 members strong, the club has worked on projects as small as toy cars to as big as a 20-foot-long, 8-foot-tall cage for a condor at Liberty Wildlife in Scottsdale.

Receiving a wood piece, rather than a piece of paper or paint, gets a huge reaction. The woodworking club members make the toys or keepsakes ranging from star-shaped jewelry holders, prayer boxes, Mancala game sets, cars, and birdhouses and sends them with an unfinished surface. The kids then can decorate the toys how they want, provided with paint, glue, glitter and other things.


