CARR KEEPS CARVING TWO NEW WOODEN TRUCKS FIND HOMES WITH KIDS AT SCHOOL, CAR DEALERSHIP

Parents and children passing by or attending The New School in the Heights on Heights Boulevard might notice a new set of wheels greeting students near the school's playground.

In front of the playground sits a small, wooden recreation of a 1926 Ford Model-T pickup truck, complete with a steering wheel and even a small horn. The wooden truck is a contribution from Paul Carr, whose woodworking attracted attention earlier this year when he placed a similar wooden train in Donovan Park. While the Houston Heights Association eventually dismissed Carr from his contract position for apparently not asking permission to build the train, that hasn't stopped Carr from building more wooden models. In fact, that same controversy has attracted others in the community to reach out to Carr to have a wooden vehicle of their own, like the NSH's education director Jeanette Salinas.

"I had built a train already and wanted to do something different, so I suggested putting together a truck," Carr said. "Now they're talking to me about wanting to build something else for them. This winter, I'll probably build them something else to put out here as well."

Carr also built a second wooden model for Tommie Vaughn Ford on Shepherd Drive. The truck now sits inside of the dealership's main lobby, and Carr said it will be given away to a lucky child later this year for Christmas.

While the heat inside of Carr's workshop might be too much during the summer, Carr said his biggest joy comes from seeing children interact with his creations.

"I'm just enjoying doing it for the kids," Carr said. "It's been a real thrill to me to watch the kids climb all over the train at Donovan Park and, once school starts, I anticipate I'll be coming down here to see how much they like this, as well."

The truck is not only built to last, but is also built with safety in mind. Carr pointed out the truck's lumber is treated for weather and is waterproof, and the wood was fastened with screws rather than nails. The truck also lacks jagged edges for children to get caught on.

Salinas said having the truck at the school for children to interact with would benefit the school's younger children immensely. The NSH focuses on providing education for students from kindergarten 8th grade who may excel academically, but may have had delays in the development of social skills.

"Academically, they function really high, so they're going to dive into the history of that vehicle and they're going to love that," Salinas said. "The fact that he could put so many things together and tie it into a play structure is amazing."

Salinas said the only costs the school covered were the materials needed for the truck, but Carr's time came at no cost.

"That talent is really a gift," Salinas said. "We're really thankful."

Peter Doe's home office computer printer had been sitting for two years on a cardboard box. With plenty of wood, and an eye for something colorful, he crafted this snazzy printer stand mostly from poplar accented with some well-placed carving. Peter painted it with the best quality semi-gloss house paint he could get using brush, roller, and wet rag for textures. The drawer fronts are attached to the trays with hand cut dovetail joints and mounted on metal slides. He wanted the drawer insides in contrasting black. He found some 30 year old water based stains in powder form that filled the bill nicely.



Chuck Graham took a former cedar fence post and crafted it into small jewelry box. Chuck cut the back side off first before cutting out drawers. Then he cut the ends of the drawers off and hollowed out the insides. Keeping track of all the parts was most challenging. Chuck stained it dark then finished with polyacrylic.

Dean Grimes made these crosses and bottle stopper from tree limbs (League City oak, as he puts it). The crosses were made on a lathe and the bottle stopper on a bandsaw.




Niklas Oberfeld showed his experiments in laser cut necklace blocks of polymer clay, plastic, gold or silver metallics in walnut, cherry, and plywoods. Tiny, intricate, and fascinating!



Ron Kuenning said his Cat project can be a paper towel or a toilet paper holder. Ron is making these for the craft show coming up this fall. The vase is made of black walnut from his folks' place in Nebraska. The graduated boxes are of black walnut and an ash that was blown down. They are finished in polyurethane and wax.



Sean O'Connor showed projects that he crafted at the Heritage School of Woodworking – Foundation Class. The table was made of black walnut all with hand tools. He is especially proud of the smoothness of the legs. Sean showed slides of his bed frame and advised asking a friend to help out during gluing. Sean says that no matter how slow your glue is, it isn't slow enough.



SEPTEMBER SHOW AND TELL

Chuck Lickwar's made two full sets of Adirondack chairs plus a table also of western red cedar. He used a natural cedar semi-stain. Chuck soaked the legs in a pie pan full of sealer overnight for extra protection against the elements. He expects the projects to last three years before restaining.




Note the details of the joinery! 200 pieces! The sign Chuck made of western red cedar just about says it all. He used a router pantograph but did have to manually clean up the tracks.



Bob Wink knew that our speaker would be talking about recycled wood so he brought in his "hound dog" made of everything recycled. (A real junk yard dog?) The tail was once an air compressor hose, the neck was a gutter curve. To grace Bob's porch for Halloween, Bob crafted this spooky fellow, also of recycled products. A trick-or-treater repeller? Oh, it's Robot, the Wink Wookie!



Norm Nichols caught a couple of winners with these Sue Mey patterns: this Crappie fish was scroll sawed in Red Oak, stained, then finished in polyurethane. The Cross is poplar. The Manger-in-a-box holds all eleven pieces for storage, is in mahogany and mesquite.

Fred Sandoval showed the club one of his favorite tools - a device with which to cut grooves.





SPEAKER RECAP: JOSE MARTINEZ, NEW LIVING

New Living is in the Rice Village at 6111 Kirby Dr. focusing on local production by working with local wood furniture makers who stand by our mission statement and use our eco-friendly products and also with steel/metal artists/fabricators who can deliver a very contemporary linear design (clean and simple). We are very open to working with newer faces and get to know our wood working community bringing back the made in the USA tag to Houston and the rest of the nation.

BEARS REPEATING ... FROM KHOUTV INTERVIEW

A Houston business is taking what many consider trash, and turning it into Treasure.

Inside an old Houston building that now sits abandoned on Canal Street, Jeff Kaplan and his crew are gathering old wood.

"We're kind of like modern-day trash collectors," Kaplan jokes. "[The wood] was probably 300-year-old wood that served as beams for another 100 plus years. Now we're rescuing it and are going to build furniture out of it at our shop."

The shop on Kirby Street is called **New Living**. A business that is just as conscious of its environmental and social impacts, as it is of its profit margin.

"Me and my partner really wanted to start a local business that had a serious community impact," Kaplan explains.

They collect downed trees after a storm or rescue wood from buildings about to be torn down. Then, local artisans are employed to build one-of-a-kind pieces from recycled material and non-toxic chemicals.

"Everything is locally sourced and locally made," says furniture designer Jose Martinez.

"A lot of people approach us with something that they have, like their old floorboards, and say, 'Hey! Can you make me something out of something that I used to have and now it's going to get torn down?'"

One table in their shop comes from a 300-year-old sycamore tree cut down in 2013. At the time, it was said to be the second tallest tree in all of Harris County.

"Wood, like people, records its history," explains Kaplan. "If you cut open a tree and look at its rings you can tell so much about that tree's life. If it got sick or if there is a period where there was a drought."

To Kaplan, it's not just about building furniture but creating a healthier and stronger community.

"We need a community of people that care about the local economy and local production. Our philosophy is, let's build together."

Kaplan invites those in the community to **let New Living know if there is an old home or building set to be torn down**. New Living is located at 6111 Kirby Drive.

Jim Carr sends a comment on hand rubbed finishes. He used plain boiled linseed oil on a rifle stock and it came out beautifully. But, he did use an unorthodox method. He used only my finger to rub in the oil and only re-wet his finger when he felt a drag. This method works well for small or intricate projects.

Also you may decrease your drying time by using denatured or 90% isopropyl alcohol. They are also less toxic, med chain hydrocarbons (paint thinner/mineral spirits) can be neurotoxic.
