I personally learned a lot, even though I have some familiarity with hand tool techniques.

Hide glue. This has been on my to do list for quite some time, but I've never really gotten started. I even bought a \$5 mini-crockpot at a garage sale in preparation for this (I have no idea if it will hold the right temperature). We pretty much got the complete tutorial on using it, and seeing the live demonstration really helped. I'm going to get off my duff and order some.

Krenov style sawhorses. I've been using two Workmates in lieu of sawhorses for the last couple of years. They are good tools, especially for heavy work, but they lack portability. They're just too heavy. So I have an opening for sawhorses, and Frank's looked good. Simple to make, light, and accurate.

Planing. You would think that I would have no use whatsoever for planing tips, but you would be wrong. In watching Frank, I can see that I need to get a bit more speed into my plane strokes.

Dakota Premium Hardwoods. When did these guys hit town? I had never even heard of them until the July meeting.

Endgrain. I can't wait to try out the tip about 50/50 water/ethanol.

This is just a partial list, so you can tell that I thought the seminar was great.

Frank Strazza was our featured speaker for the July meeting. Frank is an award winning furniture maker working out of a small studio shop in the Texas Hill Country. He has been building furniture for over 25 years. Frank employs centuries old techniques to



produce his furniture. He only uses solid wood throughout. Frank uses hand tools to create precision hand cut dovetails and surfaces that are hand planed to perfection. Each piece is signed and dated. During this all-day seminar Frank built an end table with a drawer, utiliz-

ing both hand and power tools. He demonstrated mortise and tenon joinery, created tapered legs, solid drawer construction, and half blind dovetails. Admission to this seminar was free to members as well as guests. Lunch was available for members and guests. There was no Show and Tell in July due to the special presentation. Below are pictures from the seminar. Photos and commentary submitted by Gary Rowen.

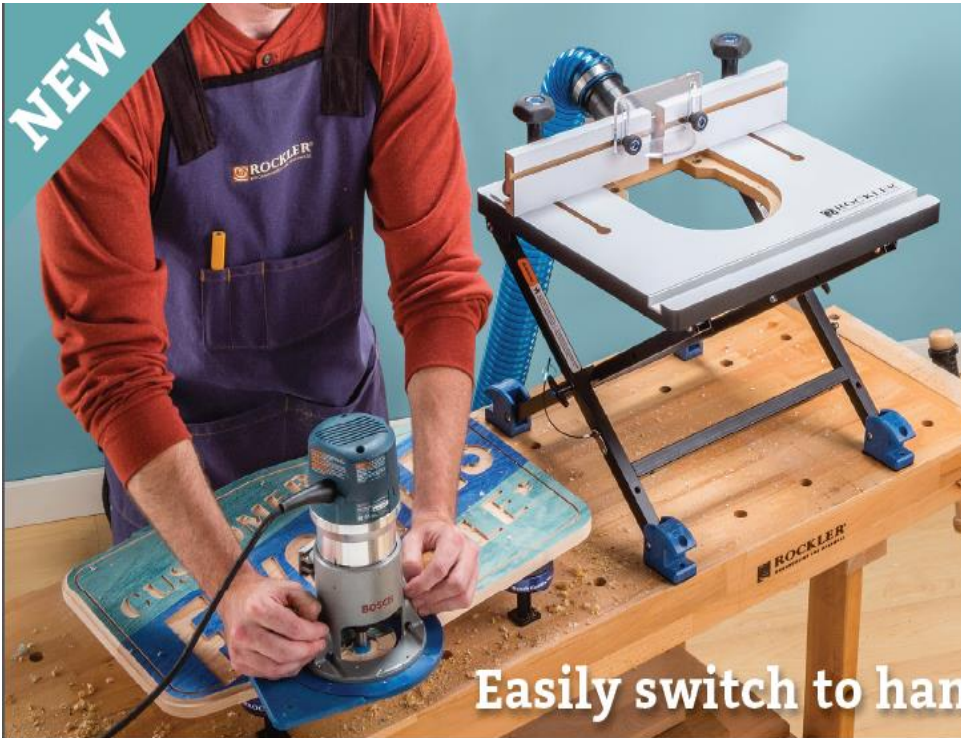
