Finally, if you are not making toys but are interested, we can help. There are patterns that can be made on a variety of tools, including simply a table saw. You do not need a band saw or scroll saw, but a sander and router make finishing the toys quick work. Talk with any of the toy makers for ideas for toys you can make with what you have available. The Club provides the wheels and axles, and even scrap wood. Sometime in the spring, we will try to have another toy build at the St. Lukes' United Methodist.

#### **Meet the Member**











Bryan started woodworking as a kid in the early 1980s, by helping and listening to his dad, with some of his projects during the cold winter months in Amarillo Texas. They made many trudging trips throw knee deep snow around the outside of the house to the workshop his dad built. It was a fairly small shop, but large enough to be equipped with a good selection of stationery power tools and hand tools.

When the elementary school he attended began to renovate, he started pestering the construction guys about some of the solid wood being removed. His dad was a bit surprised when he told him, they needed to go up there and pick up the salvaged wood that Brian had the guys set aside. they drove up there and was quite shocked at the pile with their name on it. His dad had picked all of the quarter sawn white oak and pine, and it was used in several projects to follow. He also found himself watching all the woodworking shows of the time and buying up some tools at various garage sales and antique stores.

His real interest took off when he acquired a 1952 Mercedes Benz. The car was built the same then as it would have been pre-war era. Lots of wood in the body work, basically it's metal skins over beechwood framing. They had to completely redo the drivers side door after it began to fail, and refinish all of the finer woodwork around the windows and front windshield.

Unfortunately as a middle teen, his interest in the woodworking kind of wavered a bit, and soon found himself in college. That's where he picked up woodworking again. He made some rudimentary furniture, a mobile kitchen island, a sliding "barn door", and a lot of other odds and ends. After college found himself doubting the quality of many furniture pieces being offered through retailers...and that just fueled his desire to make his own pieces.

He mainly does projects of various difficulties for himself, family, and friends. Brian joked a bit with Tom McLaughlin that though he enjoy the idea of making chairs, he waded off too deep in his first chair project as requested by a friend.

Then started only with a rough sketch and no real knowledge of rocking chairs. Still consider this to be one of his finer pieces...and possibly the only rocker he may ever make. Originally came around to a few meetings in early 2014. That summer he was involved in an accident electrocution. That finished off his career in railroading and left him grasping at a great many things that he once did with ease. Today Brian is still working at regaining the abilities he once had, he nearly stopped woodworking all together, but slowly is relearning and just too stubborn to give up.
